


# **PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT**

REACH Elyria

**REACH Behavioral Health** works within EA schools to provide individual and group therapy to our students. This year, REACH opened a new standalone counseling center on the **EA Elyria** campus. offers this same REACH compassionate, empathic care to members of the community. The new counseling center offers services ranging from individual and family counseling and psychiatry, .





# What's going on at EA?




Ravenna's VisionQuest program, located at EA Ravenna, is ramping up its life skills curriculum to include even more student-run businesses. The program, which serves 25-35 students with disabilities, focuses on four pillars of independent living: employment skills, health and nutrition, community engagement, and independent living. The employment skills pillar has long housed the student-run Cubby Cups coffee cart business as well as PawPrints screenprinting and design. This fall, grEAt Outdoors Groundskeeping joined the roster of student-run businesses. Students learn gardening, landscaping, and other outdoor upkeep and maintenance skills by caring for the school garden and baseball field as well as adding flower beds to the building entrance. Building Director Michael Horning plans to expand grEAt Outdoors this winter to include some simple building and carpentry projects such as epoxy tables. When asked about VisionQuest, Horning explains that as some students move through the EA program, "academic goals are no longer the driving force and vocational/independent living goals need to become our primary focus." By creating a robust, hands-on curriculum, Horning and the VisionQuest staff are fostering independence in well-rounded, focused, and competent young adults.

This year, Brook Park campus broke ground on its new playground! Thanks to the support of our school community, local businesses such as Black Horse Construction, and a generous \$30,000 donation from Mike and Franscene Davis, the owners of Rock-n-Roll City Harley-Davidson, the new facility is currently in use for the new school year. The playground has been a longtime goal for Building Director Jennifer Napier. "For me, it's always been important for my students to have a place to play. The trauma some of them have experienced is life changing, and not a lot of them have a safe place to play outside," says Napier. "They don't get as much exercise ... they don't have community playgrounds ... or even the ability to get to certain places. I wanted them to have a place to play. Play heals, and they learn from play." The new playground is already an enthusiastic favorite Brook Park's K-12 students. "They love it!" Napier says. "They actually helped me pick it out! I picked out a few in our price range options with climbing and large motor work, which can help them metabolize the cortisol that trauma can cause – and they chose their favorite." EA thanks our donors and all the Brook Park staff for making the playground possible - including the maintenance staff who worked with the manufacturer to build the playground on-site.









# Springfield's 3rd Year.

EA's newest campus, EA Akron/Springfield, opened its doors to its first class of students in 2019. 2021 marks its third full school year. Now serving 32 students from 13 school districts in the greater Akron-Canton spanning grades area K-12. Akron/Springfield offers credit recovery, day treatment, and specialized autism services through Coral Autism program. Under building director and former EA teacher Tyler Eliason, Springfield is poised for even more exciting growth in the third year. 
# **Director Spotlight** Jennifer Napier

Jennifer Napier, the Building Director at EA Brook Park, is celebrating her 13th year at EA this fall. Napier started out as an intervention specialist for EA in 2008. "I was a teacher initially ... in a classroom until 2012, and that is when I became a director," she explains. Napier's education roots go back even further than her decade-long tenure at EA. "I started teaching in 1998; I was an English teacher in a charter school," she says. "I found that in my experiences with teaching general education that the special education students were my favorite. ... They provided the biggest challenge for me but the one that I enjoyed the most."

Napier is passionate about helping students unlock their potential, and she believes it is limitless. "I was always excited by the idea of challenging myself and the students that I worked with to do things they didn't think that they could do," she explains. "I always wanted and still want for kids to feel important and to feel like they are capable of doing things they didn't know that they were capable of doing. My philosophy on education is that a teacher is only as good as how capable she makes her students feel."

An enthusiastic and engaged teacher, the transition to Building Director was a challenge for Napier, who initially missed teaching her own class. "The kids are the thing that make me happy, that's where I find my joy – even now. Making the transition out of the classroom, I felt that I could meet the needs of more kids as a director - if I could teach others ... that means more kids were getting the benefit of that. That was the reason I wanted to be a director. I wanted to help other people understand the students we work with. I want to teach other adult professionals how to work with our kids to give them what they need," says Napier.

As Director, she prioritizes teaching acceptance, cultural diversity, and celebrating differences. She explains, "we've been celebrating different cultures because we are such a diverse group of people. We want to make sure everybody feels celebrated, feels seen, feels validated. We've been working to celebrate cultures, we try different foods. We try to open doors and open minds." Together with her staff, Napier makes a positive impact in the lives of EA students every day. We are so grateful for her enthusiasm, innovation, and leadership!


