PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT REACH Expansion

REACH Behavioral Health works within EA schools to provide individual and group therapy to our students. REACH offers this same compassionate, empathic care to members of the community. In 2022, REACH is planning to open two outpatient counseling new locations - one in Cleveland's neighborhood Westpark and one in Ravenna, serving Portage County. Opening in late spring, these new locations will help bring REACH's unique model of mental health to more of Northeast, Ohio. The new counseling center offers services ranging from individual and family counseling and psychiatry to child and adolescent and couples counseling.

Experienced, caring therapists apply the same concepts used in our schools to **help community members achieve healing and growth.** Services are open to the entire community, regardless of whether they are affiliated with EA schools.

Director Spotlight Michael Horning

When EA Ravenna Building Director began his teaching career, he wanted to teach social studies. It wasn't until he was assigned an "inclusion class" with special education students that he began to explore learning more about special education. "I really liked the class. When I moved .. the district was changing their model and wanted teachers to take kids who were on the ED unit... I volunteered because I'd liked it so much during student teaching, and I never looked back." Horning pursued his Master's degree with a specialty in Emotional Disturbance and kept going. Starting at EA as a teacher, he was intrigued by administrative opportunities yet was concerned he wasn't ready. An sudden opening gave him an opportunity to lead a a building on a temporary basis. Horning quickly found he had a passion and talent for leadership ,mentoring teachers and creating a school culture.

He continued in the role, and 5 years later he leads EA's largest school building. Horning says, "I don't miss the classroom. I love teaching, but my role has shifted. When I taught, I only affected the kids in my four walls ... Now my impact is within my whole building, with my teachers," he explains. "I'll watch a lesson and see pieces and parts of what I've taught them. I feel like my presence and what we set the culture here emanates now throughout the school community. I can see it in the families and students ... Now the building is my classroom."

Horning takes that responsibility very seriously. He feels deeply for his students and teachers because he is connected to the community. "The house where I grew up is a 12 minute drive from my building," he shares. "There is nothing better than going back and making a difference because you remember how things were when you grew up." Horning remembers a lack of robust services for students who were struggling when he went to school. He believes the future can be brighter. "I was from Portage County. I know that there was a lack of services for our kids. I want this county and the people around us to understand we're invested.."

While Horning's boundless energy extends to expanding services and launching more community mental health services (in partnership with REACH Behavioral Health), he never loses sight of the day-to-day. "I think the most rewarding part for me is when you have a student who really struggled and you sit down with them and they have a smile and they're just happy to come to school, they're accepted, they feel safe, they have a good time." When asked how he manages to do all this, Horning is quick to give all the credit to his staff. "My staff is just great, they come in every day, they work really hard, and it really is a big family down here," he explains. "No matter how hard the day was, we can always smile at the end of it."
